## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

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## TRIO PROGRAMS

TRIO is a federal outreach and student services program that is meant to identify and assist students from disadvantaged backgrounds attend college. TRIO has 4 different programs Academic Achievers, Talent Search, Upward Bound and Upward Bound- Math and Science.
